### 1988 PROGRAM RESULTS

OUT OF POVERTY: The TUP process, launched in 1979, has given over 65,000 of the poorest people in the world the opportunity to lift themselves up out of poverty by creating businesses they have planned and managed themselves. During 1988, 4,727 TUP businesses were started, making a total of 10,334 businesses since the program began.

SELF EMPLOYMENT: To encourage poor people to invest unemployed time, TUP spent \$704,119 in 1988. This encouraged the entrepreneurs to invest an estimated 19,296,051 hours of work in business enterprises they planned themselves. The cost to TUP was 3.6 cents per hour.

SELF HELP RATIO: Each group records the value they place on an hour of their time. The average for 1988 was 40 cents. At this rate the hours they invested had a value of \$7,718,420. The investment by the entrepreneurs in their time alone was 11 times that of TUP's total expenditures.

INCOME FROM SALES: Their work produced a total annual estimated gross income from sales<sup>3</sup> of \$4,581,757. This is 6.5 times the cost of the TUP program.

PROFIT: The total profit, projected for the first year of business was \$3,318,614. This is nearly 5 times the cost of the TUP program.

CAPITAL CREATED: Each group had agreed to save or reinvest at least 20% of the profits made in the first months. The average reinvestment was 70%.

THE COORDINATORS: TUP entrepreneurs have been helped to record their TUP Business Plans and Reports by Coordinators. There are over 1,200 TUP Coordinators in 83 countries.

ACCOUNTABILITY: As stated in UNDP News of April 1987, TUP has "impeccable financial accountability and solid records and reports of its accomplishments. With its carefully designed forms and simple procedures, and its creative use of microcomputers, TUP is able to manage a widely spread programme of activities with a minimal staff."

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Beginning fund balance reflects a 40% reduction in the grant commitment liability from the previous year. This reduction reflects Trickle Up's experience that 60% of recipients of initial grants request second grant checks within one year.

Figures for hours worked, sales, and profit are projected for twelve months from actual results reported after an average of 3.5 months in business.

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
